



## CEOs Message



Marion Graves, Chief Executive Officer

This winter has been a most challenging one and I am sure that you are as anxious as I am to welcome some sign of spring. Since the beginning of 2014, we have experienced a few days of program closures that resulted from extreme temperatures and blowing snow which caused dangerous driving conditions.

This is the first time in almost a decade that Simcoe Community Services has closed programs due to severe weather. The Select Committee on Developmental Services continues its work and many self advocates, groups and family members have made presentations to them related to issues that exist in the developmental sector. At present, we have been advised that the interim report of the Select Committee will be issued no later than February 26, 2014. Once this report is available, SCS will create an opportunity for discussion for those interested in receiving information about the main themes presented to the committee. The Ombudsman's office continues their work. A report should be available by early summer.

As part of our "Looking to the Future Plan", we continue our efforts to transform our currently owned buildings to meet our present and future needs. In some cases, needs have changed and the current footprint and design are no longer suitable. Some areas are too small and others are too large and not fully utilized. There are heating and cooling issues that require correction and the cost of leasing space has presented challenges. We anticipate the completion of the

work at 40 Fraser Court by fall 2014 and look forward to establishing programs presently conducted out of 129 Ferris Lane and 39 Fraser Court at this newly renovated site.

Our staff team continues to work on the SCS strategic plan and, most recently, Fred Galloway facilitated a session wherein the work plan and timelines were decided. Over the next several months, each program will identify and address the specific projects that will bring us closer to meeting our goals during the term of the strategic plan.

As a member of the Child, Youth and Family Services (CYFS) Coalition of Simcoe County, we participated in a strategic planning day in October, working with a number of our significant community partners. Together, we identified some strategic goals that will form the basis of our work for the next few years.

Through its Barrie Housing Support Services, representatives from Simcoe Community Services have been active in their work with Barrie Pathways which is a collaboration of community agencies with the goal of creating a service and support hub for people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness. We are very

pleased to be a member of this important community initiative.

I am so proud to recognize the United Way Campaign Committee at SCS that recently received an award for hosting an "Outstanding Employee Campaign" (500-1,999 employees). Thank you to the leadership of Kamila Romanowicz and Caitlin Foisy and committee members Renee Felker, Angie Bendo, Joanne Bimm, Leanne Ross, Carolyn Harris, Anne Zarecky, Patricia Carruthers, Tania Drury, Jamie Ellis, Aaron Neuman and Tracey Bedford for this achievement. Caitlin and Kamila were also nominated as Employee Campaign Coordinators of the Year. Renee Felker and Carolyn Harris were nominated for Ambassador of the Year and SCS was nominated for the Outstanding Agency Campaign Ward. We are very grateful for the energy and commitment you have all demonstrated in assisting United Way in surpassing their fundraising targets this year. United Way is a significant funding partner for several programs at SCS. I am sure you join me in anxiously awaiting the first sign of spring after a long Canadian winter.

## Barrie Housing Support Services to the Rescue

Financial hardships can produce stress, anxiety, and worry. People can lose their homes, utilities can be cut off, spending becomes tight and so much more, depending on the severity of the situation. Barrie Housing Support Services has a program that helps with utility and rental arrears called the Housing Retention Fund. One woman, Dorothy (alias name for confidentiality reasons), came in to Barrie Housing Support Services searching for assistance with her utility bills. She was behind in the payment of her utility bills to the point that a disconnection notice was issued for her hydro, gas and water bill. As her situation was discussed, it became apparent that Dorothy was on maternity leave from her full-time job. She was a single parent with EIGHT children. The lack of regular income seriously affected her budget, considering her grocery bill was approximately \$1400 a month. Fortunately, she was able to apply for the Housing Retention Fund and was approved to pay for her utility bills before the disconnection happened. Had she not connected with Barrie Housing Support Services that day, she and her eight children would have been living in a house with no power, no heat and no running water.

## Preschool Services

### Community Partnerships Enhance Baby's Beginnings

The Simcoe County Infant Development Program provides service to our agency's youngest clientele. Referrals come from many sources including parents, doctors/paediatricians, community agencies and hospital Neonatal Intensive Care Units.

For some of these little ones, their entry into life has been quite a journey. In some instances this journey includes an extended stay in hospital in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU). We know that, in order to best support these infants and their families, collaboration among service providers is key.

The Infant Development Program is part of the larger Early Intervention system comprised of many agencies and service providers including specialized therapy services, Resource Teacher programs and a number of other agencies involved with families, which may include the Healthy Babies Healthy Children Program with the Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit, Community Care Access Centre, Children's Treatment Network, the Children's Aid Society, as well as government and private funding agencies. Joint home visits often occur with many of these agency providers in order to best support families with their goals for their child and family.

In order to better assist families to enter into the service system, the Infant Development Program has recently partnered with Royal Victoria Regional Health Centre's Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU). Beginning in August 2013, the Infant Development Supervisor, Patricia Kneeshaw, has become part of the team supporting infants and families at Paediatric Rounds in the NICU at RVH. Under the leadership of Neonatologist, Dr. Vincent Ho, the team includes the Resource Nurse, Social Worker, Occupational Therapist, Physiotherapist, Dietician, Pharmacist, Healthy Babies Healthy Children Program Public Health Nurse and Infant Development Supervisor. Each family with an infant in the NICU and their Registered Nurse is invited to attend as well to update the team on the baby's progress and receive direction and "next steps" for their care.

Families who qualify for community services are informed of the service and referrals are made at that time. The continuity of care and support that families and their infants receive through this partnership has been valuable and truly appreciated by the families and the community partners.

## The Benefits of Early Years Programs – A Parent’s Perspective

Juggling 4 kids is a definite challenge at times. Keeping them busy, happy, healthy and active has been an important part of our everyday lives. When I had my first daughter, Brianna (now 12), we were fairly new to the Innisfil community. After a visit from Welcome Wagon, we quickly learned about the Early Years Centre and their programs. We were excited to take advantage of their programs and meet some people from our community. Very quickly my daughter and I were enrolled in several programs, meeting new friends, and having the staff advise me of other programs and links to help me with the many questions of a new mother. The Early Years Centre became a big part of our everyday life. Once my second daughter was born, we joined groups that could involve both an infant and toddler. We took advantage of

the open play time to help my children socialize and share and enjoy the many activities and crafts. Once my children became preschool age, I wanted to be sure they had every advantage to succeed with the transition from being at home with mom, to a full day at school. The Early Years Centre gave me the information I needed to decide to enroll my children in a local preschool program. My children developed the basic skills needed to feel comfortable with the transition. The Kindergarten teachers acknowledged their skills and were aware that they had the benefit of preschool behind them.

Several years later I had premature twins. (29 weeks). As they developed a little slower than a full term infant and toddler, I again wanted to give

them the same opportunity as their siblings, so we once again sought out the Innisfil Early Years Centre and took advantage of their programs. (I was happy to see a lot of familiar staff faces.) Now with my twins becoming preschool age, we will take the same advantage and enroll them in the same preschool and hope they develop the skills and the advantages they need to enter Kindergarten next year.

In today’s society, I feel our children need to be given every opportunity to achieve great success in their lives. The Early Years Centre definitely was an amazing centre for my family to be involved in, with many friendly staff that could always inform you of their services and programs for infants and toddlers.

### Raising the Roof of O’Brien House

O’Brien House is home to 10 adults with intellectual disabilities in the twilight of their life. The property is located in Shanty Bay and has been owned by Simcoe Community Services Foundation for the past 10 years. It was built and acquired by generous contributions from the community. In order to adequately maintain O’Brien House, significant upgrades are needed for fire safety and a new roof is needed.

The residents of O’Brien House enjoy their life in this country oasis. Marion Bell has lived at O’Brien House since 2004. She is a bright, joyful 83 year old woman, with an infectious smile. She is very fashionable and wears purple highlights in her hair. Marion enjoys her suite with private bathroom and view of the surrounding landscape. She enjoys the company of her housemates, sitting around the kitchen table with a cup of tea and chatting.



Marion was very close to her sister-in-law (Emily Bell) “Lee” as she liked to call her. Marion and Lee would visit regularly and Lee always had a gift for Marion. Lee survived Marion’s brother Charlie Bell and lived on her own even though she was legally blind, until her passing at 96 years of age this past December. Lee left a very substantial legacy behind to support the people and causes she loved. Lee’s gift continues to give in her passing, by helping to assure the future for her sister-in-law Marion, who she loved so dearly, and others living at O’Brien House.

Lee’s generosity, and that of other donors in our community, is ensuring that O’Brien House will continue to be a safe, comfortable and dignified place to live for the older people who we support.

It will cost over \$200,000 to move forward with the significant and necessary improvements to O’Brien House. With Lee’s recent donation and previous funds raised, we are nearing our goal. We still need \$65,000 to raise the roof of O’Brien House!

Shane frequently mentions his glasses and asks if he can get new ones. The cost of a new pair of glasses is \$300. # In Memoriam

## Remembering Diane Grier

Diane was born on April 1, 1941 in Midland, Ontario to Helen Contois and Norman Grier.

When Norman returned from the war in 1945, the family moved to South Porcupine, Ontario. Norman procured work as an underground miner in the gold mines and the couple purchased a small house. On June 14, 1946 a brother, Brian was born.

On January 31, 1951 tragedy struck the young family when Norman was killed in an underground mining accident. Economic realities resulted in Diane being sent to live with her grandpar-

ents in Midland. Helen remarried in 1953 and Diane returned to live with the family who had moved to Schumacher, Ontario (a suburb of Timmins).

Diane and Brian's relationship strengthened as 12-year-old Diane and 7-year-old Brian spent extended periods of time together, particularly during the summer vacation months. A favourite haunt of the pair was the playground at the Schumacher Public School, where Diane could enjoy one of her favourite activities, riding the swings while singing at the top of her lungs. No one was there to complain about the lyrics or the tune.

Schumacher was also blessed with an outdoor swimming pool, which was only open during summer vacation. At that time, a child's swimming pool season pass could be purchased for the cost of 35 cents. Passes were purchased for both children, and Brian with Diane in tow made daily pilgrimages to the pool, weather permitting. Diane would demonstrate her

swimming prowess by sitting in the water on the pool steps and dunking her face.

When not at the playground or the pool, the siblings spent their time playing, generally with each other. On one very memorable day, late in the summer of 1954, Diane was taken away in a car with no explanation given to eight-year-old Brian. The siblings were separated and it was later learned that Diane had been placed in the Ontario Hospital School, in Orillia.

One cannot begin to imagine the shock, the fear, or the loneliness Diane must have endured when she was sent to live in an institution for the next 34 years.

In 1974 the Ontario Hospital School, Orillia was renamed the Huronia Regional Centre and placed under the Ministry of Community and Social Services. In 1988, as a result of de-institutionalization, Diane moved to the community to the care of Simcoe Community Services. She went to live with Home Providers, Sue and Jim Darlington in 1991, where she remained as a member of their loving family until they retired in 2007. Subsequently a new family was found for Diane. The Strachan Family (Sean, Denise, Mack, Rachel, Seneca, and matriarch Gail) instantly fell in love with Diane and she with them.

After a lengthy search, Brian located his sister at Simcoe Community Services and made contact with Kristen Hummel, Diane's social worker. After some introductory confirmations, she worked her magic and the siblings, Diane and Brian enjoyed a tearful reunion on May 29, 2011.....57 years after they had been separated.

The reunion was short lived, however, as Diane passed away suddenly at the Royal Victoria Hospital in Barrie, on December 24, 2013. Ironically, Diane passed away on the eve of her favourite holiday, when her favourite boyfriend, Santa, was on his way to visit.

A memorial service for Diane was held at the Church of Je-

sus Christ of Latter Day Saints in Barrie, on January 18, 2014. It was wonderful to see the large number of people in attendance despite the winter storm. Diane was certainly blessed with many friends.

To Kristen Hummel and Alex Deneault, Diane's social workers, and the staff of Simcoe Community Services, I cannot thank you enough for placing my sister with two marvelous families and for advocating for her over the past 25 years. Your efforts went above and beyond the job and will not be forgotten.

Jim and Sue Darlington took Diane into their family, where she spent 17 happy years. I did not get to know you, but I have no doubt that my sister loved you both....my never ending gratitude, for the love and care that you gave her.

The Strachan family, whom I did get to know. What can I say? Diane's Mom and Dad (Denise & Sean), her grandma (Gail), her brother Mack and her sisters Rachel and Seneca made her a part of their family. They loved her, cared for her and made

her life better. The whole family is very special and I love them all. It is easy to see why Diane loved them so much.

And lastly, Diane, my sister. My eternal gratitude for having been fortunate enough to know her and have her in my life. To know her was to love her. She was the most loving, innocent person I have ever known. She will be sorely missed. The world is a lesser place without her.

In the spring, Diane's remains will be interred with her father, Norman, in the Lakeview Cemetery in Midland, Ontario.
